Elections at the ATU International Convention

At the 60th ATU International Convention, which was held September 19–23, in Las Vegas, several elections have altered the leadership of our great Union.

International Executive Vice President (IEVP) Javier Perez, along with International Vice Presidents (IVPs) Janis Borchardt, Bruce Hamilton, and Chuck Watson, retired. Significantly, Yvette Trujillo became the first Latina International Executive Vice President. Congratulations to Sister Trujillo and lasting thanks and appreciation to the retiring ATU leaders.

Fourteen current IVPs were re-elected, including our own James Lindsay. I was honored to be elected as a IVP on a white ballot. The delegates vote on proposed union rules and bylaws. The International Convention is held every three years, so your own ATU Constitution and General Bylaws booklet is updated. This is because some rules and bylaws get changed at the convention. How are they changed? *Strictly by a democratic vote by all of the delegates!* As rule or law change is proposed, every delegate has a chance to speak on the issue if they wish, and then they have a duty to vote. Some rules may be approved by simple majority, others may require a 2/3 majority.

What gets voted on? Well, all kinds of things, but more importantly issues that our International will take up on behalf of all its members across the U.S. and Canada. Issues can range from politics (like who we will endorse or oppose), to social rights and activism. From the future of mass transit to remembering those who have come before us, honoring their legacy, and protecting what they've fought for. This is where we tell our GEB the direction we want to go as a union.

I certainly don't want to forget the most important votes: For our International officers and GEB! That said, it was no surprise that International President John Costa was re-elected. Brother Costa has not only moved our International Union forward since taking over, he is the first International President to travel up and down the West Coast in a long time. He is forward-thinking when it comes to his membership and is leading the union-political effort to secure legislation to reduce and hopefully stop and prevent Operator assaults. He's taken steps to make sure that no one get left behind in our country regardless of race, sex, or creed. He is making sure that everyone has their voice heard and their rights protected. Oh, and it doesn't hurt that Brother Costa is a friend of Joe Biden, the most pro-union President ever! The changes to the Constitution and General Bylaws will all be listed in your new book. Lastly, let me gratefully acknowledge the praise heaped on our International Union by a series of video appearances on the last day of the Convention. So, from the bottom of my heart, I thank you for allowing me the honor and privilege of being your Treasurer and delegate to our International Convention.

Local 1277 Shop Stewards Share Their Convention Experiences

The energy and brotherhood of the ATU International Convention is truly motivating and exhilarating. I have now been a delegate to the last two ATU conventions, in 2019 and again this year. Both times, the electricity on the convention floor was very noticeable and contagious.

At this year's convention, I witnessed the true power of the union and the cooperation between local unions, ATU International Vice Presidents, and ATU-appointed specialists, who all worked together to aid in union matters. At both conventions, I also served as a member of the Maintenance, New Technology, and Workforce Development Committee. This committee focuses on the changes in technology in the transit industry. Because it also deals with maintenance issues, many of the same committee members serve from convention to convention, just as I did, so we can make progress on specific issues.

At the 2019 convention, for example, ATU Local 241 brothers on our committee were very upset about the conditions at their shop, including unfair treatment, unequal pay, and other matters. Between that convention and this year's gathering, the ATU International worked with their local union to start to solve many of these issues. In this year's committee meetings, the members from Local 241 seemed to be very appreciative of the help. One member in particular seemed to be much happier. When I spoke with him, he said they are on the way to fixing many of the issues he was unhappy with. It was truly inspiring.

The ATU International Convention is a lot of things: Inspiring; informative; hard work; fun, and interesting. But most important of all, it is a place where working people can network and put their heads together to create a better work environment for us all. What I saw in my committee meetings, from convention to convention, made that very obvious to me. After all, what is brotherhood if not helping someone when they need you? instrument to bring about the changes we so very much need!

More than 70% of the American public, as reported by the highly respected Gallup Poll in August, now strongly approve of labor unions and the agenda we have for working people and families! This is the highest support for unions across the country since 1965!

This is very encouraging news, and it comes out of a series of union victories this year in previously anti-union corporations like Amazon and Starbucks. There's still a long way to go at both these companies and others, but the early wins point to more unionized men and women in the national workforce.

Some very positive statistics that reflect the growing importance and influence of unions:

- The National Labor Relations Board reports a 57% increase in union-election petitions across the country
- About one in six Americans now live in a union household, defined as a home with at least one union member
- Union membership has risen not only among traditional "front-line" and production workers, but also among *non*-traditional employers in healthcare, social services, and administrative/ service industries
- More than 40% of union members now say membership is *"extremely important to themselves and their families"*

Gallup also reported some more meaningful insights concerning the attraction of unions and the priorities of union members themselves:

- Two-thirds of those polled said better pay and benefits were the main reason they joined a union
- Almost 60% said it was to improve employee rights and representation
- More than 40% said it was about stronger job security
- About a third cited the need for better pensions and retirement benefits
- About a quarter of those polled mentioned better jobsite environment and fairness at work

Bottom line: Unions *work*. They provide working men, women, and families with the lifestyle they both need and deserve. Unions are a *positive force*. They spearhead the drives for income equality, expanded healthcare, better education, environmental change, job creation, and a more just society, with respect to economic and social equality and civility.

Your Union, ATU Local 1277, serves you in every way possible, and through the efforts of our International Union and all the other great national unions that represent working people, we are working ceaselessly to make or society, our country, as better and fairer place for us all!

california Closer to Mental Health Support Services for Transit Workers

Spearheaded by ATU Local 265 (San Jose), California is thankfully a step closer to providing mentalhealth support services for transit workers across the state. Governor Newsom has ok'd SB 1294, which will establish wellness centers for transit workers and their families.

"This bill has the potential to save lives," said Local 265 President John Courtney, who has led the fight for its passage. He noted that better mental-health support and counseling might have prevented the mass-shooting tragedy that struck his local on May 26, 2021, when nine ATU workers were slain by a disturbed gunman. Brother Courtney is absolutely right when he says that mental-health support and services part of every discussion on workplace safety and worker protection. No such counseling was available prior to the VTA shooting.

60th ATU International Convention Report By Mauro Varela,

This is where the delegates who represent ATU members across the U.S. and Canada vote on new International officers and the recommendations of the various policy committees. All ATU locals send delegates, and the bigger the local, the more delegates it sends.
